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### Mini Grant Recipients Share

Re: Receiving the Alpha Upsilon Grant

First, I wanted to thank everyone involved in awarding me the 2018 – 2019 Alpha grant! It was a tremendous feeling to win, and I am so fortunate to be supported during a time when many arts programs are going unfunded.

To begin with my post-purchase update, as noted in my original application, one of the tasks the students love to do most is help with the loading and unloading of our large, gas Kiln. In the pictures, you will see the three towers in which the pottery sits within or upon. The two components are the posts and the shelves. They are both made from fire-proof brick and referred to as 'kiln furniture.' However, the shelves in the kiln are extremely heavy. They weigh about 30 to 40 pounds each. Being approximately 2 feet long and about a foot wide, it is extremely difficult to not only pick up the shelves, but to also lean inside the kiln and set the shelves securely on the stilts / posts. One wrong move and a several hundred pound tower of shelving and pottery can come crashing down, breaking the shelves and kiln floor. Even worse, destroying weeks and weeks worth of student work. And... as a 48 year old, I'm not exactly fond of throwing out my back any time soon.

Therefore, having won the Alpha Upsilon grant, I was able to purchase 10, new, lighter and safer shelves called Core-Lite© shelves. Instead of the shelves being constructed of the heavier stone-wear, the Core-Lite shelves are constructed with a set of hollow tubes in the middle, making them well over 30% lighter, a huge difference when loading up 25 shelves each firing. But I swear they feel 50% lighter! I knew that students could finally help-out with the loading and unloading of the kiln furniture. And we would be a lot safer as well. Already, the purchase of the new shelves has given students the ability to start helping out in the kiln area, loading and unloading the shelves that hold the pottery pieces to be fired. I can already tell that they are so happy to be now a part of it.

As you may guess, teaching ceramics to teenagers is a tough job. It is not only challenging socially and academically, but also quite demanding physically. However, with the 10 Core-lite shelves, my ceramics class has started its journey into becoming a place students can participate and have their lives shaped for the better, just as I teach them to how to shape the clay.

To all at the Alpha Upsilon Chapter and Beebe Nuetzman Endowment Fund Committee, thank you again for making a difference in my world, as well as for the students at Arcadia High School. All the best this year!!!

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### Going Green

As we watch the effects of Cyclone Idai on Beira Mozambique it is hard to know what we as individuals can do. I read that this cyclone is possibly the most deadly and devastating ever in the southern hemisphere. However due to climate change more frequent and larger cyclones are predicted. Sadly the people of Beira contribute many times less than we do to global emissions.

Recently I went to a Climate Action Planning talk in Morro Bay, sponsored by the Central Coast State Parks Association. The speaker, Professor Mike Boswell, is chairman of the City and regional Planning Department at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo. His takeaway words were, "We as individuals need to do our part but we need cities, states, and the rest of the world to do their part too".

On the Central Coast all the cities of San Luis Obispo County have inventoried the sources of their emissions such as electricity use, industry, transport and have made action plans, such as creating walkable and bikeable communities with clean public transport.

At the state level California has reduced emission targets for 2020 (back to 1990 level), 2030 (40% of 1990 level), 2045 (carbon neutral). The very good news is that we have already hit the 2020 target and we have many more people here than in 1990.

However, the easiest fixes have been done already. Some of the challenges ahead are to double building insulation efficiency (we all know about 1950s to 1970s houses), clean up ways freight is moved and reduce the methane emitted by dairies and landfills. Other goals are renewable electric power generation and capping emissions from industry.

On March 12, Nevada joined 22 other states in the US Climate Alliance, representing half the US population. These states will try to fulfill the objectives of the Paris Climate Agreement by working on the same problems as California is studying.

If you are interested in learning more there is a talk on Saturday, April 6th at 9am, First United Methodist Church, 500 E. Colorado Blvd. Pasadena, doors open at 8:30 am. The title is "Capturing Carbon and Cooling Our Cities." 
### **Get Connected!!**

### Dear Kathy,

Our students live with instability and anxiety every day. They experience significant levels of trauma; some have been victims of violence and abuse; many more have witnessed it. These children experience high rates of health problems. They also go hungry at twice the rate and have three times more emotional and behavioral problems than their housed peers. Moving and changing schools frequently takes its toll and their education suffers immensely.

Our volunteers and the relationships they form with their students make an enormous long-term difference in thousands of young lives. We know this not just because we see this on the ground, but studies of resilience have documented the importance of just one caring adult for at-risk youth. Supportive relationships are critical for youth development, providing an environment of reinforcement, positive modeling, and constructive feedback for physical, intellectual, psychological, and social growth.

In order to support and raise awareness of the work that our volunteer tutors do every day we are excited to announce our new volunteer ambassador program! Ambassadors are volunteers that are taking on additional responsibilities to help build community amongst existing tutors, recruit new tutors, and raise awareness of our work. Like you, these ambassadors support School on Wheels because they are concerned about the well-being of children experiencing homelessness, and they believe in the power of education to change lives.
