

## Purge Your Purses for Schools for Africa

\*\*\* "Education is a fundamental human right."

Schools for Africa became The Delta Kappa Gamma Society's first official international project in 2010. Since that time, members have donated approximately, \$445,134.90. Currently, the project works with 21 countries in sub-Saharan Africa. Schools for Africa's mission involves providing access to quality basic education for children, focusing on girls, orphans, and other vulnerable children.

Schools for Africa is a partnership with UNICEF (The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund), the Nelson Mandela Foundation, and Peter Kramer Stiftung (previously the Hamburg Foundation) to help millions of children access quality education. Currently, 600 million children and adolescents worldwide are unable to attain minimum proficiency levels in reading and mathematics. This learning crisis was exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic, which brought education systems to a halt.

Poverty remains one of the most obstinate barriers to education. Other reasons children are cut off from schooling are economic fragility, political instability, and conflict or natural disasters. Unfortunately, it is even more challenging for children with disabilities, those from ethnic minorities, and females.

DKG's Schools for Africa aims to transform lives through education by focusing on teacher training, sanitation facilities at schools, proper hygiene, parent involvement, landmine education, deworming (medication), and sports & play.

To <u>record THAT hours</u>, go to the home page of DKG California website. Enter sisterhood when prompted for your password. Click on the **THAT** icon and you will be taken to this form:

The form is very easy to fill out. Just enter your name and volunteer information, as well as Alpha Upsilon and Area XIII. Find a method that works for you to keep track of and record your hours - - either record hours on an ongoing basis as soon as you provide a THAT service, or record your hours on a calendar or on your phone, and transfer them to the website at the end of the month. You will need to keep track of the hours you spend in THAT activities and record your hours by **March 1**, **2023**.

While you are on the DKG California website, be sure to explore DKG's **STEP Program** (<u>Support Team for Emerging Professionals</u>). Along the top of the page, click on Committees, and scroll down to STEP. There you will find past publications, a blog, and a monthly opportunity called Tuesday Teacher Tips. Each month, a one hour free zoom meeting will be scheduled, featuring a guest speaker discussing a relevant educational topic. Register in advance on the website for the Tips you want to attend. The next one is on February 21st from 6:00 – 7:00 pm. Lisa Mackenzie will be leading an interactive workshop on mindfulness and how it can help kids and teachers in the classroom. Her presentation is entitled, *Clearing the Clutter in Our Minds*. (I don't know about you, but that topic definitely resonates with me!)
