

BNEF Mini Grants Are Awarded!!

Applications for Alpha Upsilon Mini Grants were receied from five districts: Alhambra (2), Arcadia (12), Glendale (3), LAUSD (3), and Pasadena (4). A total of \$11,137 in grants for a variety of projects was approved. The 2021 Mini-Grant Committee granted funds to twenty-five projects in these categories:



- 5 Books
- 2 Art materials and tools
- 3 STEAM and maker space materials
- 1 Materials for science experiments
- 5 Social-emotional support, enhancing collaboration (includes 1 conference attendance with associated materials)
- 2 Music instruments & music
- 1 Aids to increase student focus in class
- 4 Dual language & culture immersion materials to enhance programs

The BNEF Board of Directors applauds the Committee in their choices. It is a delight to support the excellent programs represented by these grant applicants!

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A Word of Inspiration from Ana

For those of you who have given up on New Year's Resolutions; for those who think you are too old to start something new; for those of you who start each year with "why bother I never get past February?" I hope this will inspire you.

In sixth grade I was put into the low reading group - a scarlet letter for which I was ashamed. I loved books, picture books mostly as I have no recollection of any teacher putting a chapter book into my hands and believing I could be a reader. Oh how I would look forward to our weekly walk to the school library. The beloved librarian would make me giggle while she read aloud about the antics of Mrs Piggle Wiggle, who had a cure for everything. If only I was a reader. Did she have a cure for that?

It was high school before I truly read a novel cover to cover under the guidance of Mrs Selsby at Hoover High. She made <u>The Great Gatsby</u> come alive and for a moment I thought I was a reader. I wanted it. I hoped for it. I even attempted it over and over. But I quickly accepted the fact that I did not identify as a reader.

Years later, I realized that not being a reader did not mean I wasn't smart. In fact I could read a handful of pages at the beginning and a handful at the end, pick a fact or two from the center and I could write an "A" paper that would be returned garnished with generous comments on my understanding of the book. Yes, I became an honors student and even graduated from a top university, making teaching my career. A teacher who wasn't a reader?

I have since read many books, mostly professional and self-help type, or non-fiction books where I could skim or read parts as needed. Participating in many Bible studies and reading to know God more certainly filled up the rest of any time I had. I have read children's and preteen novels while teaching thousands of kids to read and how to love reading. I knew their tricks and showed them the right path. I would share my story with them and how I didn't want them to miss out on this amazing gift.

In January of 2021, I was invited to join a book club. However, this group would be full of readers. Adult readers. I thought to myself, "I am not a reader." "I won't be able to keep up. Don't they know I'm busy?" "I will embarrass myself." I hesitated, after all, I hadn't discussed a book with anyone over the age of twelve since college. But we were just ending 2020 and still very much in the middle of a pandemic that I wasn't sure I would survive. So in the face of death itself ...I set my New Year's Resolution to become "A READER." Twelve fiction novels, in twelve months, with monthly meetings at the end of each book to hold me accountable. My goal was set. I said YES! Yes to trying one more time. YES to a new beginning. YES to facing my fears.

Turning the TV off was not as painful as I expected. Reading soon became the escape I needed from my crazy pandemic filled life. The relationships the characters engaged in helped me forget for a time how I missed the face to face relationships we had pre pandemic. I admit some months I wasn't sure I could finish and engaged the help of Audible, a delightful app to help me multitask. I refused to quit! With each month I felt encouraged, I learned new things about myself, I made new friends, and read books I would have never thought to pick up, but enjoyed. My life is richer now.

As we come to the end of the year and I am reading the final book, I find myself slowing down, savoring each word, touching every page and inhaling it's very essence, as I realize that by the end of it I can say with full confidence,

I AM A READER!
