

We are aiming for a fall collection at our Welcome Back Dinner on September 11. This is a non-profit organization that gives educational opportunities for homeless children. They survive solely through donations from individuals and organizations like ours.

Kathy Cockerill and Penny Schopflin have agreed to continue to co-chair this philanthropic project to collect backpacks and needed school supplies to help School on Wheels continue their incredible work of providing one on one tutoring to homeless children from kindergarten through twelfth grade. Meghan Livengood - Impact Article for DKG Grant

I used all of the grant money that I received from the Delta Gamma Kappa Society International Organization to buy French books for my classroom. My classroom was very much lacking in French books, and my classroom library was mostly English books, which was not helping my students to grow in their French language acquisition nor their French reading skills. They have to practice reading French books on their own as well as read books with me during stations in order to continue to expand their reading skills. I used other grant money that I received to buy leveled readers, which are a great additional resource, but with the money that I got from this grant, I was able to buy books that are interesting for the students to read, and that are also themed, so I was also able to buy some "reading buddies" (two stuffed animals that look like characters from some of the books) for the students to use when they are reading. I was able to get book series as well, which give the students an example of book series in French, as we are learning about how to write our own French series books at the moment. These books will and have given students the opportunity to read books independently that are in the target language, which will enhance their French language skills and reading skills as well, and it will also give students more access to a print-rich environment in the French language as well as books that are actually interesting for them to read. Some of the books include P'tit Loup, Le Loup, Tchoupi, and Petit Ours Brun. Also, many of these books are relatable to students because they talk about reallife events and have morals, including things such as going to school, dealing with friends, and holidays. Thank you for giving us access to such wonderful additions to the classroom!
