#### **Mentoring Members**



Imagine a new member walking alone into a room for her first DKG chapter meeting.

First impressions will determine how that new member feels. How quickly you show hospitality when she arrives at the meeting shows her the focus of the group. Are you so involved with catching up with old friends that you do not even notice her? Do you stop to introduce yourself, encourage the new member to come sit with your group, and involve her in the conversation? Little acts of kindness can

put her at ease and make her feel a part of the group. This is one small way to mentor.

All members can be mentors through actions and deeds. This is why it is important that everyone is willing to invest time and energy in the new member and take a strong interest in the success of the chapter/Society. As the new member shares her interests and passions through conversation, the chapter president can begin to involve her in committee work and chapter projects to help her have a sense of belonging and purpose in the chapter. Recognizing the leadership potential of new members gets them involved and keeps them active plus gives them value in the Society.

# Cornetet Award: Professional Development Opportunity




The Cornetet <u>Award</u> is an award available through International. It was established from the estate of Lucile Cornetet for professional and personal growth of women educators. Awards are given for individual professional development and educational seminars.

For individual professional development, electronic applications need to be submitted before the award dates of May 1 and November 1. Only employed educators may apply. This is an opportunity to get help paying for registration fees and conference-related materials, travel, lodging, food, and other expenses necessary for participation in professional development activities. As of February 2020, \$801,200 (USD) has been granted to individuals for professional growth.

The Cornetet <u>Award</u> also may assist state or province organizations of Delta Kappa Gamma Society International in sponsoring a professional development educational seminar. Electronic <u>applications</u> need to be submitted by November 1.

#### **Educator's Book Award**




Each year the International Book Award Committee selects a book for members to further their personal or professional growth. The most recent book selected is *Unveiled Truth* by Gail Goolsby. Gail, a member of Beta Rho Chapter in Kansas, discusses the lessons she learned leading the International School of Kabul.

Susan Perkins, Kansas State Organization Webmaster and Editor and Past Kansas State Organization President wrote this about *Unveiled Truth, "Gail Goolsby has written a book that tells the story of her time as the leader of the International School of Kabul and the challenges she faced as an educator and woman living in Afghanistan. Her accounts of the experience allow us to view a different culture and how challenges like this make us a better person..."* 

The committee selected the book for its readability and shared topics with the other books reviewed and recommended by the committee this year. Included in those topics were women's issue of equality, inequities in educational opportunities based on financial status, engaging the reader in using the Socratic Method of inquiry, and a story of inspiration of growth through both failure and success.

The Educators Book Award Committee encourages members to read this book and highlight it in newsletters, websites and at chapter meetings. Using it in a book discussion would introduce members to the Afghan culture and people. Gail's questions at the end of each chapter would also encourage members to think creatively about their own lives.

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That's **LIFE**!! Life is a non-profit foundation created by DKG California to foster literacy in our schools and community. Once you are a member of DKG you are automatically a member of **LIFE**. Funds are raised by donations, an Amazon Smile account and a book sale and raffle at the annual DKG convention. Buck a Book sales at our Chapter meetings raises funds for our chapter's annual donation of at least \$100. With virtual meetings, we need an alternate method to collect donations. She has willingly given her time being an effective recruiter of prospective members, served as co-president in 2016-2018, shared her home for meetings, served as chairperson for the Area XIII annual conferences for 3 years, and adds tremendously to every committee on which she participates. Pat is a retired math teacher from Glendale Unified School District. She is a highly creative person working with stained glass and using her own kiln to make jewelry, plates and décor. She has even taught us to make glass jewelry!

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### Mini Grant Recipient Shares

App Academy is a four year long computer science program at Pasadena High School, designed to develop programming skills through a variety of tools and languages. 9th grade students take a Web Development course using the programming language Javascript. This course is designed to be an introduction to the fundamentals of programming, as well as an introduction to the process of web development.

However, one of the issues that the course ran into - and that many high school computer science courses run into - is that there was not an academic high school level textbook available that covered the concepts using Javascript and the p5.js library. Available textbooks covered different curriculums, were not at a high school level, or were extremely technical and difficult to read.

Deborah Orret, 9th grade App Academy teacher, designed a course book specifically to be used alongside the 9th grade Web Development class. A digital version was provided to the class - but there was no printed version available. While ebooks offer more accessibility, research has shown that students learn more effectively from print textbooks than from digital versions. Thanks to the generosity of the Alpha Upsilon's Beebe Neutzman Endowment Fund, 60 course books were printed for student use this school year and for the future ones to come. While the digital version will remain available to students, the course books will allow students to check out a book and read it both in class and at home.

The following are student quotes regarding this course book, displaying the impact it had on their educational experience:


"I looked back to the course book whenever I felt lost, or forgot about a concept in class."
