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



## Tips for Staying Calm and Relaxed

We all feel stressed, anxious, or angry at times. Those of us in the classroom have many anxious students. When you feel this way, it's important to have a toolbox of calming techniques to help you relax. Here are some quick and easy calming techniques.

- **Breathe** Breathing is the best way to feel calmer. Take a deep breath, count to four and the slowly exhale. Repeat.
- **Relax your Body** Drop your shoulders, then flex and release all the muscles in your body, from top to bottom.



- Visualize Calm Close your eyes and visualize yourself in a peaceful setting, feeling calm, relaxed and stress free.
- Go Outside If you're feeling stressed or anxious, going outside for some fresh air and a short walk can help.
- **Keep a Centering Object** A centering object is any object that you can turn your attention to when you want to feel calm.
- **Challenge Negative Thoughts** Question a stressful thought by asking, "Is it likely to happen?" or thinking, "Even if it happens, I can handle it."

Not all calming techniques will work for you all the time, but if you have a toolbox of techniques, you can feel confident in your ability to handle stressful situations. There are also some apps for adults and children to combat anxiety and reduce stress.

- Aura This app has it all: a mindfulness journal, meditations, nature sounds, life coaching, and more! (iOS, Android)
- **Colorfy -** Adult coloring books are known for helping to ease anxiety. This app takes the coloring to a digital environment, but the soothing effects are the same. (iOS, Android)
- **Happify** Find out your happiness score and start improving it today. Find science-based activities, meditations, and games to play to soothe your mind and up your happiness! (iOS, Android)
- **Headspace** Meditation is key and Headspace is probably one of the most notable apps to help start meditating. It comes with guided and unguided meditations to help you soothe any anxiety. The app comes with ten free sessions, and then you'll need to subscribe. (iOS, Android)
- **Sleep** Meditations for Kids Created for children of all ages, this app guides kids to the creative part of their mind through a number of carefully scripted story meditations. (iOS)

Smiling Mind - Daily mindfulness and meditation for kids and adults! (iOS, Android)

Mindshift - This app is targeted to help adolescents, teens, and young adults gain insight into and basic skills to manage anxiety. It contains educational information about common sources and symptoms of worry, anxiety and panic, and has a checklist for users to complete to help determine the types of anxiety they most commonly face. (iOS, Android)



Did you know the World Fellowship Committee began in 1946? Yes, four German women were the first to receive funds to further their studies and visited Sweden for eight weeks in 1948! Next, in 1952 a DKG- UNESCO alliance was formed and provid-

ed special help for Korean women. Next, between 1958 and 1960, an agreement was made with the Institute of International Education (IIE) to provide dossiers from which a Society committee could select recipients for study in the US. Then a program was set up to involve approved Canadian universities. Finally, in 1972 the World Fellowship Committee became a standing committee.

Since 1960 to date DKG has awarded \$3,729,250 to 1029 women in 122 countries. Contributions have been \$4,158,947.75, through June 20, 2021. You can be sure <u>your</u> <u>donation to World Fellowship</u> will be put to good use! Not only the women who receive these awards will benefit but also those whose lives are touched by them in their home-land.

Currently there is one World Fellowship studying in California. She is Marisol Tolis from Argentina and is studying at Cal Berkeley. Marisol was able to take a short break from her studies and attend the 2022 convention!




First and foremost, thank you for the opportunity to try something new with my 3rd graders at Holly Ave Elementary. With the new addition of personal clipboards, storage, and cushions, students are enjoying the freedom to sit and work with different students and away from their desks. Once the clipboards were numbered, students were eager to use them. Even when I forget about them, students definitely do not! Students are given the opportunity and freedom to choose where best to learn. Some students are learning they can make good choices, while others are learning how to make better choices. Students use their own numbered clipboard and store it in the same slot on the clipboard holder. This helps keep everything organized and I can quickly see which boards are missing. In addition, students are being held accountable for their materials. No one wants a dirty or broken clipboard. In addition to the clipboards, the grant money was spent on seat cushions. There are 3 sets of 6 stationed around the classroom. Students LOVE using the cushions. Some place their bottoms on it and others will lay across it on their tummies. The clipboards and cushions have given students flexible seating options. Even during a lesson, students may choose to grab a cushion and clipboard to sit closer to me or the screen. Again, I am so grateful for the grant money to purchase materials that have enhanced student learning and social interactions.

This grant has allowed my students their first exposure to Makerspace! Students got to utilize a variety of materials supplied by this grant to plan and build different kinds of foods. As a teacher, I understand how important it is to nurture the engineering and problem-solving skills in my students to help prepare them for the future. I plan to continue to conduct Makerspace for my students with higher STEM tasks, giving no explicit directions but allowing students the liberty to explore on their own to plan and execute their projects. We will use the organizational shelves provided by this grant to store and organize our projects and materials on a weekly basis. Thank you so much for allowing us this opportunity - our kinder hearts are so thankful!

Thank you so much for giving me the grant to purchase yoga mats for my class. My students were thrilled to receive them! They look forward to reading, studying, and completing work on the yoga mats outside everyday. They also enjoy stretching and exercising on the mats as well. With these mats, the students are able to enjoy the fresh air outside without burning themselves on the hot pavement or getting a rash from the itchy grass.

This year has been tough on the students because it is the first time they have been back in the classroom with other students in almost 2 years. Some of them have had trouble getting back into the routine. These mats have helped because they allow us to take a break to do mindful breathing in nature. This really helps the children calm down and start the day with the right mindset.

Due to Covid, we were encouraged to keep students 6 feet apart at all times while indoors. Doing this prevented the spread of illness, but also made it very difficult to have any kind of group work or paired discussion in the classroom. We would go outside frequently so the students could work together on engineering, text dependent questions, peer editing, and more. While the students were excited to be working with each other, they were uncomfortable on the ground. These yoga mats changed that!

Every day, at least one person asks if we are going to go outside on the yoga mats. They truly love using them and look forward to our time outside. It is interesting actually, because I would ask them to do a social studies assignment in the classroom and I received groans, but when I asked them to do the same assignment outside on their mats, they literally cheered. These mats have really helped the class dynamic and have made it comfortable for them to work together outside.

With this grant, I was able to purchase 21 Rainbow Fish Boxed Book Sets for my transitional kindergarten class at Baldwin Elementary in the Alhambra Unified School District. Board books are the perfect types of books for children at this age because they can withstand being reread countless times. At this point in the school year, my students are so eager to begin reading. They were so happy and excited to get their own set of books into their little hands. Since each student has the same set of books, we are able to use the books whole group and in small groups for practicing our book handling skills, concepts of print, retelling the stories, identifying details, and developing our oral language and vocabulary. Thank you for helping our youngest learners understand how books work and fostering their love for reading with these highly engaging set of books!

Thank you for the opportunity to provide eight more cameras to Arcadia High School's Photography program! There have been four different teachers in the past 6 years teaching photography and the organization of the classroom was in bad shape. We had over 20 obsolete cameras that were not worth fixing with only about 10 reliable DSLRs for a class of 36. With five classes, that meant I was sharing 10 cameras for 170+ high school students. I was in dire need of having more cameras for smaller groups for each of my classes.

We now have 24 working cameras which means some students have a camera each, or at most, a group of two. We are able to do more activities, dedicate more time to edit, less down-time, and most importantly, students are more engaged with the material I've been trying to teach them all year. Photography is ubiquitous in today's technological world. Students are surrounded by it through Instagram, Snapchat, and the advertisements they are bombarded with on a daily basis. DSLRs allow them to showcase the control they have as an artistic photographer rather than relying on their cell phone's technology to automatically do the work for them. For example, cell phones are not able to control ISO, Shutter Speed, or Aperture based on the user's desires. It's been a beautiful thing to witness students that once disregarded art now see that art is more than just drawing or painting. It's simply having an idea in your head and using the tools available to you to make that idea into a reality. DSLRs act as that tool where students are able to purposefully underexpose, overexpose, or create a deeper depth of field with the appropriate aperture. Students that were once intrigued with photography simply through their cell phones now understand the joys that come with being an artist.

This advanced portraiture assignment would not have been possible without your grant. Students were able to work on a more individual basis rather than running into complications with sharing a camera with 3-5 people. Understandably, trying to execute an individual idea among 4 people will cause some problems. The change in learning and creative atmosphere was definitely noticeable with having more working cameras in the classroom.

This is my ninth year teaching high school. I was an English teacher for 8 years before transferring to the Visual Arts department to teach photography. I took this opportunity to grow as an artist and inspire the youth through an appreciation of the arts. Seeing the youth inspired by art and taking an interest in pursuing a career in art/design was very inspiring to me. It was so inspiring to me that I realized that in order to grow as an artist myself, the sole reason why I took the photography position, I need to move on from being a full-time educator. This will be my last year as a teacher and I plan to focus in the creative fields full time. Nevertheless, the care and passion I gave this past year will put all future photography teachers in a better position than I was placed in August 2021. The new teacher will have an easier time teaching the youth about the importance of art and being creative for the sake of being creative with the materials you allowed us to buy.
