

Challenges for Homeless Students

Dear Kathy,

Students experiencing homelessness face numerous challenges when starting a new school year, as their lack of stable housing can significantly impact their educational experience and overall well-being. Some of the key challenges they may encounter include:

- Educational disruption: Frequent moves and the uncertainty of their living situation can lead to stress, anxiety, and a sense of insecurity.
- Limited access to resources: Our students need access to essential resources such as backpacks, school supplies, and a stable internet connection for remote learning.
- **Transportation issues:** Getting to school regularly can be a challenge for our students, especially if they live far from their school. DKG Alpha Upsilon Minutes

September 14, 2023

Home of Pat Rabe

- 4:35 p.m. Welcome: meeting and program began with Co-President Willy Crouse leading the Pledge of Allegiance. Thirty-four members were in attendance, with 3 guests. Thank you to Pat Rabe for opening her house for this meeting and to her and her committee for refreshments: Marcelyn, Ardis, Marty.
- -Willy encouraged the chapter to embrace the Alpha Upsilon theme this year: "Expanding Opportunities" by considering an AU position on the board next year.
- -Inspiration: Ana challenged members to "walk out our front doors and take risks." She gave an example of her willingness to learn academic Spanish to help students at her school.
- -Purpose: Karen Gollhardt, Co-President. shared this meeting will address goal #1: to unite women educators of the world in genuine spiritual fellowship, #3: to advance the professional interest and position of women in education, and #6: to inform members of current economic, social, political, and educational issues so that they may participate effectively in a world society.

PROGRAM: Judi Healey. introduced three volunteer opportunities and the women who would speak on them.

- 1. Pasadena Humane Society: Sarah shared that a volunteer may work with the public, as well as with animals. There is a self-paced application. The Humane Society has free adoption days, free educational talks, and one-time service projects.
- 2. Glendale Memorial Hospital Neonatal Intensive Care Unit: Gail Dunham shared her volunteer work experience and encouraged members who are interested in cuddling newborns (older than 35 weeks gestation) to apply. Other possible tasks are answering phones, stocking bed-side carts, and running errands to the lab/pharmacy.
- 3. STEP and THAT: Karen Wilcoxen highlighted why help is so vital in classrooms today. Due to factors such as lack of teacher prestige, satisfaction, increased stress, unreasonable expectations, teacher shortages are at a crisis level. DKG members can help by being a mentor, working as a volunteer in schools, and supporting teachers through the needs list that Karen will post on Google Docs.

Mini Grant Recipient Shares

Jan Tappan heard from one more of the 2023 Mini Grant recipients and her use of her grant.

The Get Your Teach On Experience in My Classroom By: Arus Boggs

The purpose of the grant was to be able to pay for registration for the Get Your Teach On (GYTO) conference. This conference is like no other! There is a message of self care for teachers at the forefront of education, but there is not very much support out there. That's where GYTO comes in. This organization is about pouring into the individual and empowering teachers; as well as providing teachers with teaching strategies to bring engagement into the classroom. This conference not only reminded me about my "why?" (Why did I wanted to become a teacher?), but also introduced me to new research-based strategies that I was able to implement immediately upon our return from summer vacation. One of the many strategies was new ways to build a classroom community where students are comfortable with making, and learning from their mistakes: as well as supporting and encouraging/ uplifting each other. Other strategies included many ways to engage and connect my students to what they are learning by making their learning fun, through an interactive experience, like a Totally 80s themed instructional day or an interactive Escape Room around a specific standard. One of these activities includes playing a game of "Tic Tac Toe" while reviewing concepts taught in math. Playing games brings out the competitive side of students, and they don't realize they are learning. Through these activities, students are enjoying learning and getting to know each. This conference, and in turn this grant, taught me new tips and tricks, on best practices, as well as new ways to build a successful, engaging and rigorous classroom.
