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

Proposed 2022-2023 Budget



The Finance Committee met on August 10th to create the proposed budget for 2022 - 2023. The committee consists of Judy Kearns and Mary Lou Langedyke assisted by

Rose Gant, treasurer, Willy Crouse and Karen Gollhardt, co-presidents. We would like to thank the committee chairs and officers for submitting your financial needs for the upcoming year.

For the past three years, the budget document and process has evolved providing us with the ability to track expenditures and plan for the year. The first change was to provide a two-year overview. Next, specifics for membership expenses was added as well as two new expenditure categories, Committee Expenses and Officer Expenses. Rentals and Teacher Appreciation are new line items.

A budget is a working document, a guesstimate of future needs. Some items were below expectation, some on target, and one or two over budgeted amounts. Expenditures of \$ 50 or more over the stated budgeted amount must have approval of the Chapter President. (Chapter Rules, Article 4, B1).

You will note that membership numbers stayed the same this year. The numbers in parenthesis indicate those numbers. The first number is membership in 2021-2022, the second number is from 2022-2023.

The proposed budget will be voted on at the September meeting. The Finance Committee will be happy to answer any questions you may have. Remember, the purpose of a budget is to guide and help planning for the 2022-2023 fiscal year.

Once a month, a one hour zoom meeting will be scheduled, featuring a guest speaker discussing a relevant educational topic. Register in advance on the website. 

Mini Grant Recipient Shares

Jan Tappan received some Mini Grant Reports after the June newsletter was published. Those reports are being shared in this issue of the newsletter.

Originally, I was granted \$500 for an XP pen and headphones, because I need an XP pen for online teaching and headphones for students taking the AAPPL test. However, my school bought a box of headphones for each classroom teacher before the AAPPL test. Therefore in April, I asked if I could use the money for headphones on Mandarin materials that I need to buy from China and also for the shipping fee. My request got approved. I bought the materials from Taobao.com which is a popular online shopping platform in China. The materials were shipped on May 21th and it took 5 weeks to arrive in Los Angeles. I have to wait for all the materials to arrive to take pictures and write reports, that is why I turn in the report late. I bought the XP pen in March for my online teaching. I used it while I was presenting documents on the project. XP pen can help me annotate on digital documents much easier than a mouse.

The materials that I bought from China are Chinese lanterns, paper cutting materials, Chinese classroom decorations and Chinese reading and writing teaching supplemental materials. Since our program is a Mandarin dual immersion program and we emphasize Chinese language and cultures, we need a lot of Chinese culture supplies and materials that are hard to find in the United States, so I have to buy them from China and ship them to the United States. The Chinese lanterns are for the upcoming Moon Festival. I will use the lanterns as a hands-on activity to honor this important festival in Chinese culture. I have two Mandarin classes, and total is around 45 students. I bought 50 lanterns to make sure every student could get one.

The paper cutting materials are for upcoming Chinese New Year activities. The Chinese New Year is the most important festival in Chinese culture. Students are going to cut the red paper into different Chinese culture symbols and paste them on classroom windows.


I also bought a model for the Chinese great inventions. I will have students try the inventions while I am teaching the China unit in history class, so they will have a better understanding of how those inventions work.

Mini Grant Recipient Shares

Thank you very much for the opportunity to use grant money from your organization in order to teach kitchen science to my students. We focused on the science principle of matter and did about 5 different experiments that were written up by the students.

In the study of matter, we used food and other things from the kitchen to show how matter can change. We used ice cream floats, lava lamps, baking soda and vinegar volcanoes, turned milk into plastic, and did experiments with eggs. I have provided some photos from some of the experiments. The kids really had a great deal of fun with all of this. We did our experiments while learning about matter, and then picked up again, at the end of the year with more experiments. The kids really were able to explain and write up their process and results. We also did a cheetos pollination experiment for the ecosystems.
