

Proposed 2023-2024 Budget

The Finance Committee met on August 9th to create the proposed budget for 2023-2024. The committee consists of Judy Kearns and Mary Lou Langedyke with Rose Gant, treasurer, Willy Crouse and Karen Gollhardt, co-presidents, as ex-officio members.

For the past three years, the budget document and process has evolved providing us with the ability to track expenditures and plan for the year. The first change was to provide a two-year overview. Next, specifics for membership expenses was added as well as two new expenditure categories, Committee Expenses and Officer Expenses. Rentals and Teacher Appreciation are line items added last year to better reflect expenses.

A budget is a working document, a guesstimate of future needs. Some items were below expectation, some on target, and one or two over budgeted amounts. Expenditures of \$50 or more over the stated budgeted amount must have approval of the Chapter President. (Chapter Rules, Article 4, B1). The numbers in parentheses indicate membership numbers. The first number is membership in 2022-2023, the second number is for 2023-2024.

The proposed budget will be voted on at the September meeting. The Finance Committee will be happy to answer any questions you may have. Remember, the purpose of a budget is to guide planning for the 2023-2024 fiscal year.

Schools for Africa



"Education is a fundamental human right."

Schools for Africa became The Delta Kappa Gamma Society's <u>first</u> official international project in 2010. Since that time, members have donated approximately, \$445,134.90. Currently, the project works with 21 countries in sub-Saharan Africa. Schools for Africa's mission involves providing access to quality basic education for children, focusing on girls, orphans, and other vulnerable children.

Schools for Africa is a partnership with UNICEF (The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund), the Nelson Mandela Foundation, and Peter Kramer Stiftung (previously the Hamburg Foundation) to help millions of children access quality education. Currently, 600 million children and adolescents worldwide are unable to attain minimum proficiency levels in reading and mathematics. This learning crisis was exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic, which brought education systems to a halt.

Poverty remains one of the most obstinate barriers to education. Other reasons children are cut off from schooling are economic fragility, political instability, and conflict or natural disasters. Unfortunately, it is even more challenging for children with disabilities, those from ethnic minorities, and females.

DKG's Schools for Africa aims to transform lives through education by focusing on teacher training, sanitation facilities at schools, proper hygiene, parent involvement, landmine education, deworming (medication), and sports & play.

***Last year, in just three meetings, Alpha Upsilon members purged their purses and collected <u>\$179.94.</u> Let's aim to exceed that amount by collecting at every meeting in 2023-2024!!


